## Year 11 - 13 Course Completion and Exams

All senior courses will finish on Wednesday the 9<sup>th</sup> of November but Teachers will continue to be available during their usual timetabled Year 11 to 13 class times until the 25<sup>th</sup> November for revision and internal assessment opportunities by arrangement only. Students are expected to sign in and out at the office.

Students attending for internal assessment and revision are asked to come in mufti.

Students who arrive at school but are not involved in revision classes or internal assessment opportunities will be asked to leave the school grounds so they do not disrupt the learning of others.

Students are required to attend prize giving on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> of December so that we can recognize the many achievements our students have already accomplished.

We wish our students involved in the external assessment process all the best and hope they get a fair opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding.

## Surplus Staffing

The 2011 School Year started with a loss of approximately 50 students, mainly as a result of the restructuring that has occurred at the Army Base in Waiouru. This came as a surprise, and was impossible to plan for. Since then we have lost more army families, while the economic situation has also forced families to move from this area in search of employment. The combined impact of the recession and the down-sizing of the Army Base has severe repercussions for our School in terms of staffing, as well as funding. It should be noted that the economic situation is having a major impact right across the country with a number of rural schools really struggling.

Since the initial roll reduction suffered at the beginning of the year, other losses have been off-set by new enrolments on a regular basis, and the roll has remained static in the 340's.

Unfortunately the Area School is still in a position of having surplus staffing. Presently we are undertaking a formal process (CAPNA – Curriculum and Pastoral Needs Analysis) to analyze our current teaching resources and needs to ensure that we can cover all curriculum areas, as well as ensuring the Pastoral Care requirements of students are addressed. This is a very involved process and at this stage we are collating data, and absolutely no decisions have been made in terms of staffing for 2012. Surplus staffing issues are often resolved by natural attrition, with people moving on for various reasons, including family, and retirement.

It is a fact of life that people talk and speculate, but any discussion about what is going to happen, and who will be effected, is

uninformed, and based on pure conjecture and gossip.

The bottom line however, is that when the 2012 School Year begins, we will be fully staffed and able to provide all current learning programmes.

## Year 7-10 Technology

### Hot tips on doing your best in NCEA - By IMOGEN NEALE

On Thursday approximately 144,000 Year 11, 12 and 13 secondary school students start their NCEA exams, while Scholarship entrants started last Thursday.

Nothing beats well-planned study, but for students light in preparation former Rosehill College dux Sylvie Chan, who has a string of academic Scholarships to her name, says if it comes down to cramming, practising the things that make up the bulk of the exam is a must.

She says if an essay is worth 40% students should focus on that, although she warns “crammers” should still make sure they get a good night’s sleep and ideally spend the day before an exam relaxing. “Don’t burn yourself out,” she says.

Number Works’n’Words Christchurch branch tutor Ivan Leary says “best of luck” to any students who’ve left their study to the last minute.

“Any work crammed at this late stage will still be helpful though,” he says.

The best plan of action is not to panic, to get a good night’s sleep and have a decent breakfast.

“With a relaxed attitude, and full of energy, all your hard work during the year should pay off,” he says.

Tips on the Ministry of Education’s Studyit website focus on what to do just before the exam and include double checking you’ve got the right time and place for the exam, avoiding people who make you nervous, and putting all your stationery in a clear bag the night before.

Once in the exam, the website advises

students to stay calm, read questions twice and answer the easy ones first.

Victoria University education, psychology and pedagogy school head Dr Lex McDonald says plan and schedule — even if there’s only a day left.

“And it’s easy to say, but don’t panic. Continue to read, summarise and put things in your own words. That way you’re more likely to remember it.”

McDonald says charts and maps can also help, as can mnemonics — such as Never Eat Soggy Weetbix to remember the compass points north, east, south and west. And even TV stars face everyday life, with Pearl McGlashan, who plays Jasmine Cooper on *Shortland Street*, sitting Year 12 and 13 NCEA exams.

The Western Springs College student says, “Keeping yourself hydrated and fed is definitely important”.

She says using your time well is important because cramming too hard means students risk burnout.

“And that’s not healthy. You’ll be too tired to do the exam and that defeats the purpose. People freak out when exams come up,” Pearl says. “But people aren’t as unprepared as they think they are.”

This year’s largest NCEA exam session is level I English on Wednesday morning, with nearly 48,000 candidates, and the smallest is Scholarship Latin, with 26 on Thursday afternoon.



## Cricket

## Community Cricket

On Saturday the **Taihape Cricket Team**, comprising Area School players as well as community players, finally got the opportunity to play after 3 cancelled games, and scored an unexpected, but deserved, win over the experienced Marton Scarens.

The Scarens batted first in cold windy conditions and scored 153 off their 40 overs. The Taihape bowling and fielding was outstanding through-out and restricted Scarens to only 43 runs off the first 20 overs. Matt Jacobsen 1 wicket for 15 runs, Wayne Davis 3 for 17, Nathan Chaney 1 for 5 (off 5 overs), Brad Fannin 1 for 35, and Mark Riley 2 for 23 were the main contributors. Kerry Read also bowled well and created a run out with excellent fielding. The fielding effort was backed up by an outstanding wicket keeping display by Dion Hooper.

In reply Taihape reached 154 for 4 in the 34<sup>th</sup> over. New comer Mark Riley led the way with an outstanding 77 not out. His innings included 10 fours, and one six. Matt Jacobsen (16), Wayne Davies (9) and Brad Fannin (8 not out) provided excellent support.

Last summer cricket was resurrected in Taihape, when we played in the summer holiday league. The initial goal was to field a College Team, but a lack of players brought about a change of thinking, and as a result a Taihape Community Team was created. The first season proved a real struggle with the team suffering a number of heavy losses. However things look more positive this summer when Taihape will be playing a full season in both the full competition, as well as the holiday league.

Two teams are participating in the **Annual Year 7/8 Softball Tournament** to be held in early December. The children involved are practicing very hard to retain the title won last year.

## Career Tips

**No idea what you want to do when you leave school?**

- Think of the things that make you happy. What subjects do you like at school? What things do you enjoy doing outside of school? List the things you like doing and rate them from one to ten.
- Give yourself permission to try out

different things. You could try designing your own apprenticeship. This is where you explore different jobs within a set time limit, say six months. That way you are not fully committed, but you can find out if you like the job.

- Another way to approach things if you have no clear goal is to work on a more general qualification. These can be applied to many different fields, for example, business administration or management. A management degree can be used in a variety of fields such as project management, logistics, or sales and marketing.
- You could also look for a course that has no fees to try out an area of interest without getting into debt.

**Too many choices, and can't make a decision?**

- When you're comparing several different Professions, try to find people to talk to who are doing the jobs you're interested in.
- Set up an interview with them to ask them about what the job is really like. This is called informational interviewing. It may show you that your dream job is not what you thought.
- As you are talking to people, take note of your gut feeling about the jobs. Is there something that really grabs you? If so, you could pursue some work experience in this job to confirm that it's the right choice.
